### **TRAININGS**


#### **Planner Training**

Guest speakers shared insights on leadership, community-driven development, and the importance of staying grounded in identity, purpose, and inspiration.

The experience offered valuable perspectives on development practices in other Indigenous communities—along with the beauty and spirit of the Rockies.






# Kwakaratón:ni

Stay tuned for the release of this special podcast episode—we can't wait to share it with you all!





The Kahnawà:ke Tourism booth welcomed approximately 150 visitors, including students, educators, and professionals. Guests enjoyed participating in our interactive trivia game and were excited to receive our giveaway items, which included winter hats, travel cutlery sets, water bottles, and tumblers.

Our team shared valuable information about local businesses, youth programs, and employment opportunities. The event fostered community connection and helped support our youth as they explore their strengths and prepare for future careers. The 4th-Year Graduation Ceremony for the First National Executive Education (FNEE) programs, held on Friday, November 21 at HEC Montréal, was a beautiful and uplifting celebration. The day began with an opening by Sedalia Fazio, setting a warm and inspiring tone for an event filled with guest speakers, singers, past graduates, and an abundance of positive energy.

Kahnawakeró:non were proudly represented across the various groups who participated throughout the past year, making the celebration even more meaningful for our community.

The ceremony began in the late afternoon and featured a powerful performance by Ivan Boivin-Flamand from Manawan, who sang in Atikamekw and left the audience in awe of his remarkable talent. The event closed around 6 PM

with a special appearance by Elisapi Issac, a singer-songwriter from Salluit, Nunavik, who offered heartfelt words of encouragement to the graduates.

As each group was called to the main stage to accept their diplomas, the stage filled with smiling graduates—capturing a moment of pride, accomplishment, and connection. The celebration continued with a cocktail hour, complete with a photo booth so graduates and their families could take home a joyful keepsake of the occasion.

We encourage community members to explore the programs offered through FNEE, and discover opportunities to learn, grow, and build meaningful connections with other Nations.

### **SHARING SESSION WITH NANO ONE TECHNOLOGIES**

On November 5, our team was invited to deliver a teaching session for Nano One Technologies in Candiac. We began with the fundamentals, as many employees were unfamiliar with who their neighbours in Kahnawà:ke are. Using maps, we highlighted the traditional territories and introduced the meaning and contemporary relevance of the Two Row Wampum Treaty.

The session also explored local land claims, offering insight into the realities our community faces amid ongoing changes in the region. Throughout the discussion, meaningful moments of connection emerged—from shared stories about maple syrup to deeper conversations surrounding the history and long-lasting impacts of the Oka Crisis.

We enjoyed continuing these conversations over lunch and encouraged participants to further their learning by visiting The Kanien'kehá:ka Onkwawén:na Raotitióhkwa Language and Cultural Center, with an invitation to experience Kanatahkwèn:ke when it opens in spring 2026.



We are grateful for opportunities like this—moments that put truth and reconciliation into action and foster stronger relationships with neighboring communities.

### KAHNAWÀ:KE TOY COLLECTABLES EXPO

The Kahnawà:ke Toy Collectables Expo took place on Sunday, November 16 at the Mohawk Super Bingo and brought together families, collectors, and toy enthusiasts for a lively community event. The venue was filled with vibrant vendor booths showcasing impressive toy collections, along with mock wrestling matches that kept children entertained throughout the day.

The Tourism Team was on site to engage with attendees—answering questions, sharing information about Kahnawà:ke, and promoting upcoming events. Over the course of the expo, the team distributed 95 Tourism bags, 12 maps, and 17 Origin magazines, featuring Indigenous tourism stories from across Quebec.

The team connected with many enthusiastic and curious visitors, making the expo an important opportunity for community outreach, education, and tourism engagement.





On a perfect winter evening, the CPKC Holiday Train made its festive stop in Kahnawà:ke from 5:00 to 5:30 PM, drawing a large crowd of families eager to kick off the holiday season. The weather was ideal—not too cold, just crisp enough to enjoy the winter spirit.

Kahnawà:ke Tourism welcomed visitors with pre-packaged holiday goody bags featuring a Kahnawà:ke Tourism holiday sticker, a granola bar, and a packet of Welch's. Right beside them, the Kateri Food Basket collected generous community donations while volunteers handed out warm hot chocolate and light-up sticks that brought smiles to children and adults alike.

By the end of the evening, the Kateri Food Basket had collected a trailer full of non-perishable items, \$1,308 in cash donations, and

received a \$4,500 cheque from CPKC to support individuals and families in need throughout the community. Santa was also on site, posing for photos and adding extra magic to the night. The atmosphere was filled with music, excitement, and the joyful glow of the holiday train—an uplifting moment of seasonal spirit and community togetherness.


