## MOVING IN AT KANATAHKWÈN:KE - A NEW CHAPTER BEGINS

April 1 marked a milestone for Kanien'kehá:ka Onkwawén:na Raotitíóhkwa Language and Cultural Center as the community gathered for the soft opening of the Kahnewà:ke Cultural Arts Center—a moment filled with pride, anticipation, and the warmth of shared purpose.

The week leading up to the event was already buzzing with energy as the Ratiwennahní:rats Language and Culture Program and staff settled into their new classrooms. The building, still carrying that “new home” feeling, quickly began to fill with laughter, movement, and the spirit of learning.

The morning opened in a meaningful way with words from Charlie Patton, grounding the space and welcoming the community with intention.

Following this, Executive Director Lisa Phillips offered opening remarks, reflecting on the journey that brought the center to life and the opportunities ahead.

From there, the excitement only grew. Community members explored the stunning new facility—each room offering a glimpse into the programming, creativity, and cultural revitalization that will soon flourish within its walls.

After the tours, guests gathered in the main activity room, enjoying corn soup, fry bread, and strawberry juice while overlooking the outdoor terrace. Even with construction still underway outside, the sense of possibility was unmistakable.

April 11th brought a powerful Seed Song Workshop at the Mohawk Trail Longhouse, led by Brooke Rice from Tkà:nios.

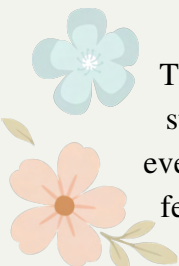

## Talking with Screaming Chef Cuisine

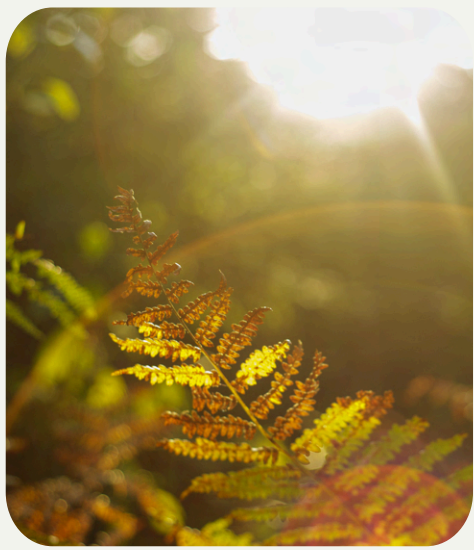

### Tour 398 – HEC Montréal (30 visitors)

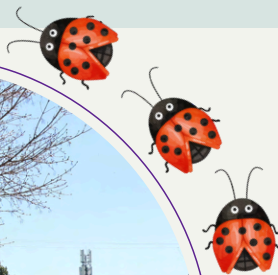

Good food, lots of laughter, and plenty of storytelling filled the night as we celebrated the incredible people who bring our tours to life.

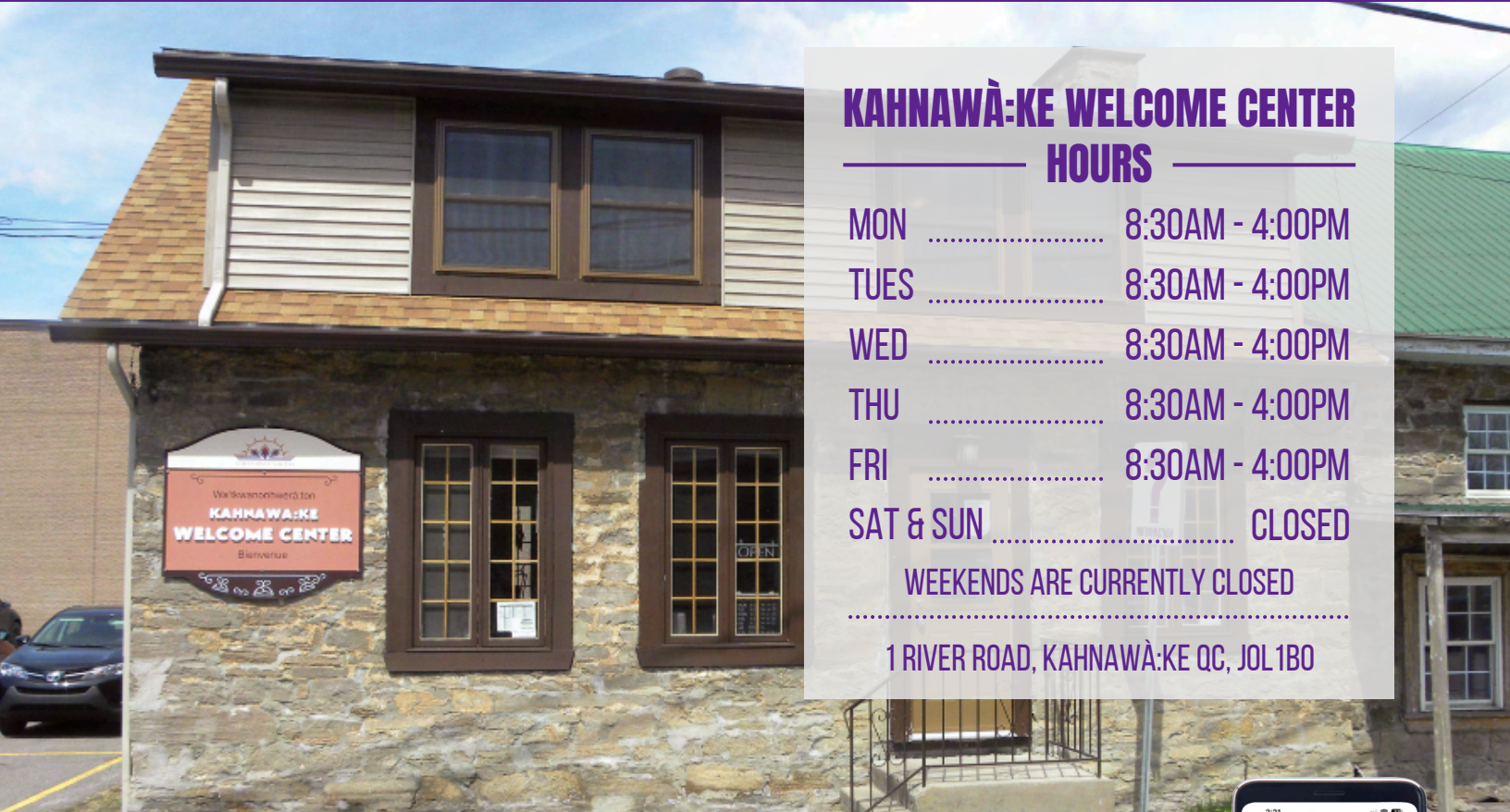
Our guides are the heart of what we do—and this night was all about saying niawenhkó:wa!

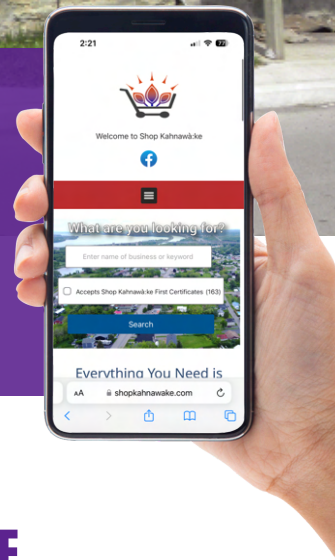

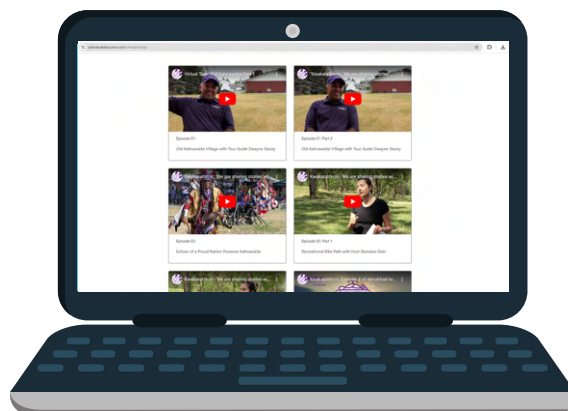

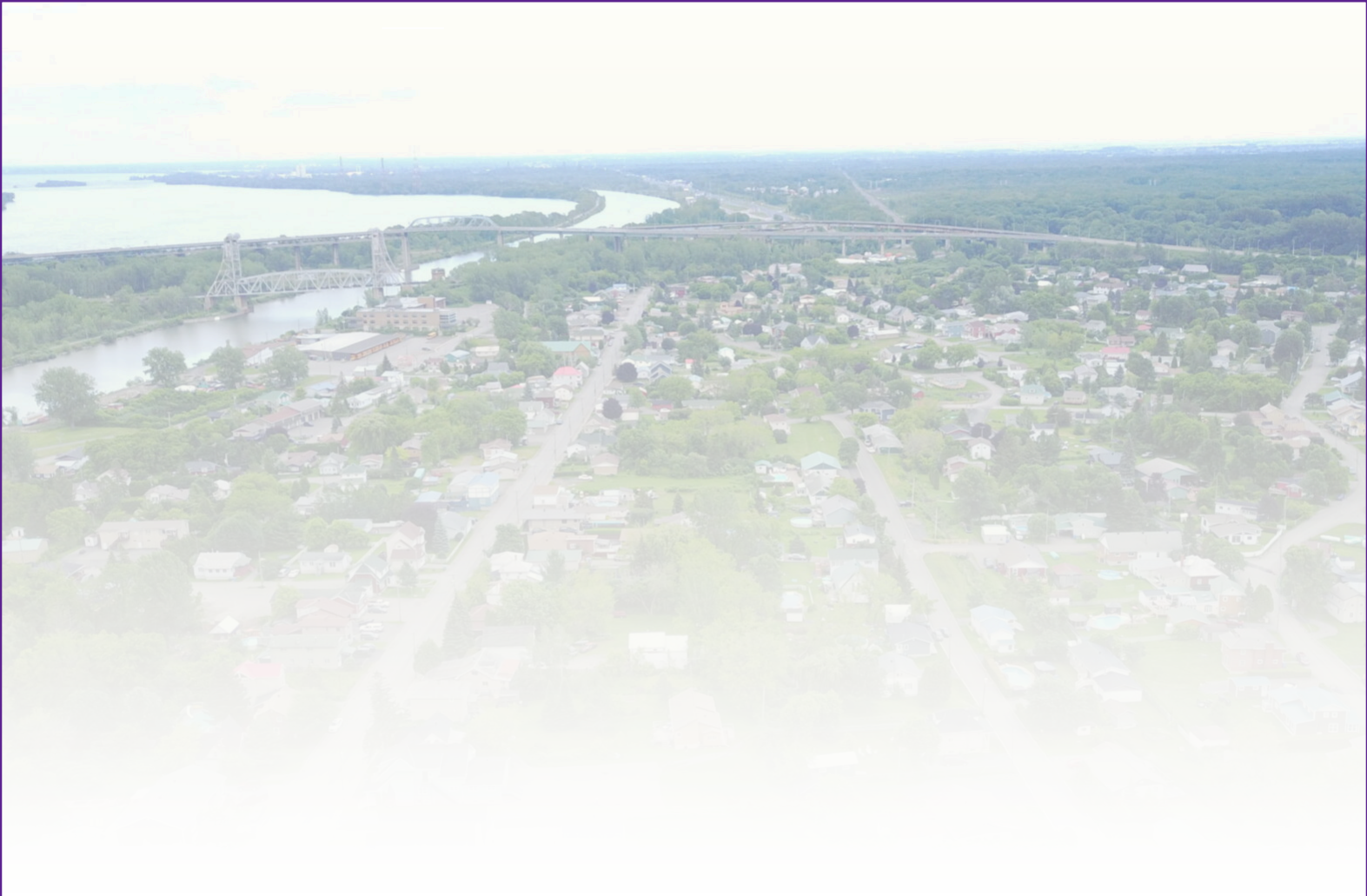
