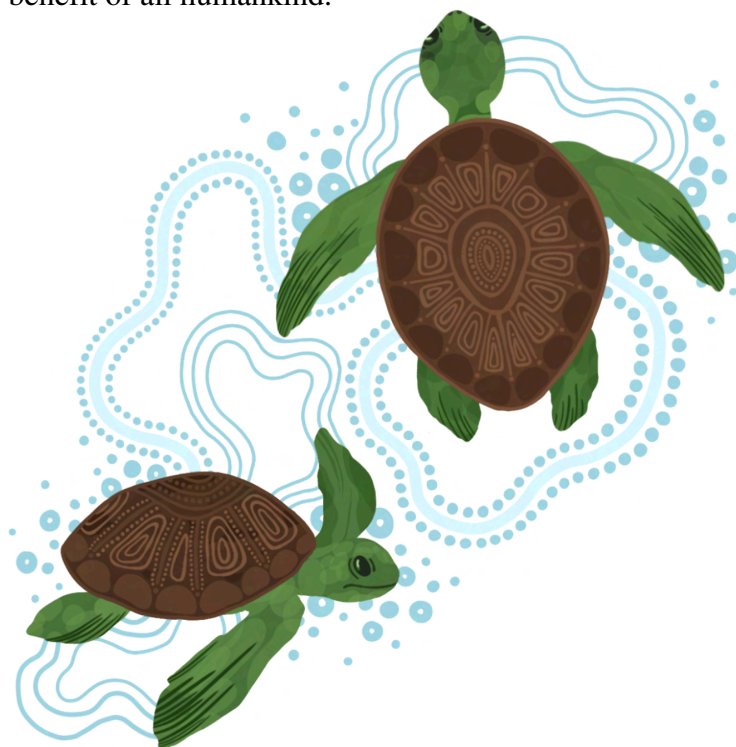
MISSING AND MURDERED INDIGENOUS WOMEN AWARENESS DAY - STANDING TOGETHER FOR CHANGE

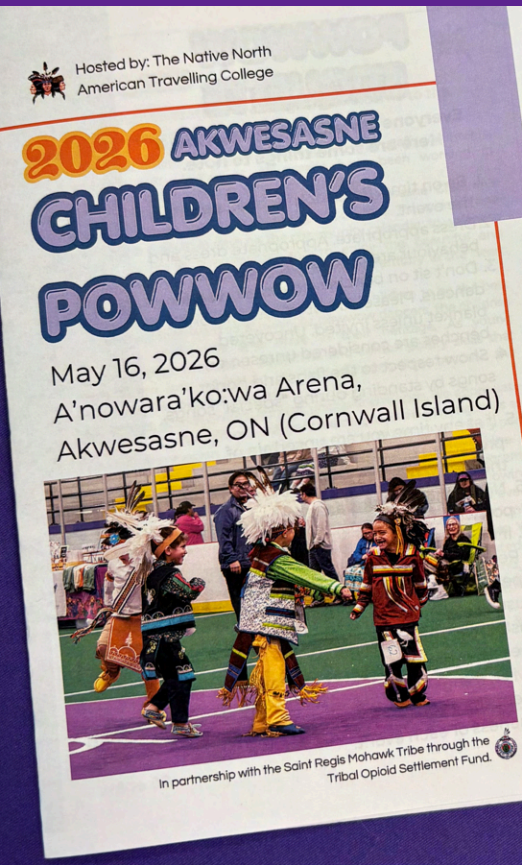
May 5th is an important day of awareness for Indigenous people, marking the National Missing and Murdered Indigenous Women and Girls (MMIWG) movement.

After attending the Summer Launch event Bronwyn Johns headed to Cabot Square, where the city came together in solidarity. The Native Friendship Centre of Montreal hosted a march from Cabot Square to Peel Street, bringing together hundreds of community members, allies, and supporters.

The evening began with an opening address from Kahnawà:ke representative Kevin Deer, who helped set the tone for the gathering and the activities that followed. He was joined by Ellen Gabriel of Kanesatà:ke, who delivered a powerful message about the importance of

working together to stand up for our rights, protect one another, and care for the land for the benefit of all humankind.





THE NEXT GENERATION TAKES THE FLOOR- TINY FEET & BIG SMILES

On May 16th, Kahnawà:ke Tourism joined the first Pow Wow of the season at A'nowara'kó:wa Arena in Akwesásne, our sister community

There's something truly special about watching young dancers gather around the arena floor, moving to the heartbeat of the big drum. The atmosphere was filled with joy, culture, and good medicine.

Hosted by Akwesásne Travel, the event welcomed families from across the region. Attendees had opportunities to win exciting prizes, including a gift basket and a custom Indigenous-art skateboard promoting the community skateboard park located on-site.

Families also enjoyed a complimentary lunch that helped keep dancers energized throughout the day.

The vendor area was bustling with creativity, featuring beautiful Indigenous artwork, handcrafted goods, and unique treasures. (Yes—we brought a few treasures home ourselves!)

On May 17th, we had the privilege of welcoming a tour group from the United States as the first stop on their Canadian journey.

Guests enjoyed an Indigenous-inspired continental breakfast catered by the wonderful team at Messy Kitchen Catering, featuring maple butter fry bread, fresh fruit, muffins, and strawberry juice.



While sharing a meal together, visitors learned about who we are as Haudenosaunee people, our role as keepers of the land, our history, our resilience, and our continued efforts to preserve our identity for future generations.

These conversations are powerful. Visitors left with a deeper understanding of Indigenous nations and a new perspective on the territories they would continue to visit throughout their travels.

THE RIPPLE EFFECT OF COMMUNITY LEARNING

On May 20th, Kahnawà:ke Tourism had the pleasure of welcoming the Indigenous Field Studies group from McGill University as part of their week-long visit to the community from May 18th 23rd.

During their time with us, students and faculty learned about the role Kahnawà:ke Tourism plays in sharing community history, culture, and visitor education through place-based learning experiences. Discussions focused on respectful tourism, cultural representation, community storytelling, and the importance of presenting Kahnawà:ke in ways that reflect Tsi Nionkwarihò:ten – Our Ways- and community priorities.

These conversations offered students an opportunity to explore how tourism can be a tool for education, relationship-building, and cultural understanding while ensuring community voices remain at the center of the story.

Niawenhkó:wa for visiting Kahnawà:ke! We can't wait to see where the connections made this week may lead. That's the beauty of community learning—the ripple effect continues long after the visit ends.



AROUND THE WORLD IN ONE DAY - FÊTES DES CULTURES

On May 23rd, Bronwyn attended Fêtes des Cultures in Saint-Constant for another day of cultural sharing and community connection.

This marked our third year participating in the event, and once again it proved to be a wonderful opportunity to engage with visitors from around the world. Booths representing cultures from every corner of the globe shared traditions, stories, and experiences with attendees.

Throughout the day, performances filled the main stage, including cultural dance groups, singers, and martial arts demonstrations.

At our booth, we proudly flew our flag and welcomed meaningful conversations with newcomers to Canada who were eager to learn about Indigenous peoples and our relationship with the land.

One of the highlights involved the children's cultural passport program. As young visitors collected stamps from participating booths, they also learned fun facts from each culture represented.

We took the opportunity to introduce youth to the significance of the strawberry in our culture, teaching them the Mohawk word Ken'niiohontéhsa while promoting our upcoming Strawberry Food Fest.



To help connect them to the teachings of the Two Row Wampum, children received small bracelets made of white and purple beads.

The smiles said it all. Connecting through tourism truly creates lasting impressions.

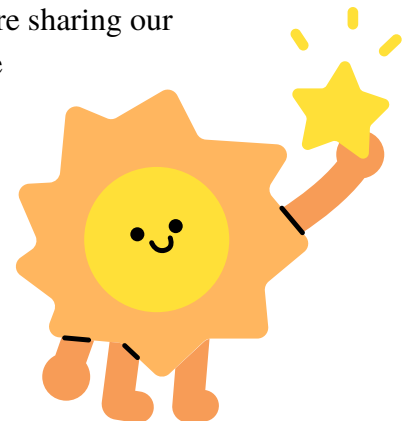
The week began with a spectacular opening evening at the CN Tower, where more than 1,500 attendees enjoyed dinner overlooking Toronto's skyline at sunset.

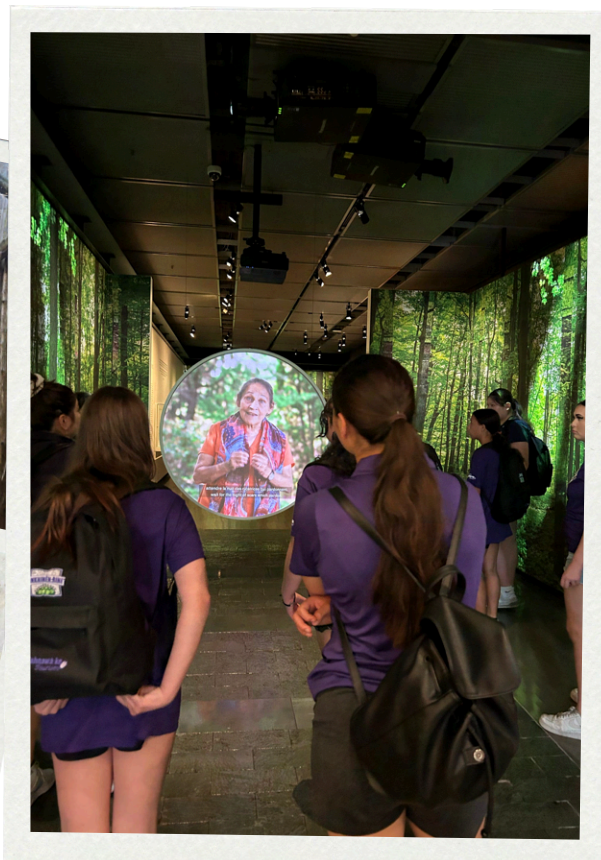
Guided by mentors, knowledge keepers, and community leaders, participants learn the importance of respect, responsibility, and community connection while developing the skills they'll carry into the future.

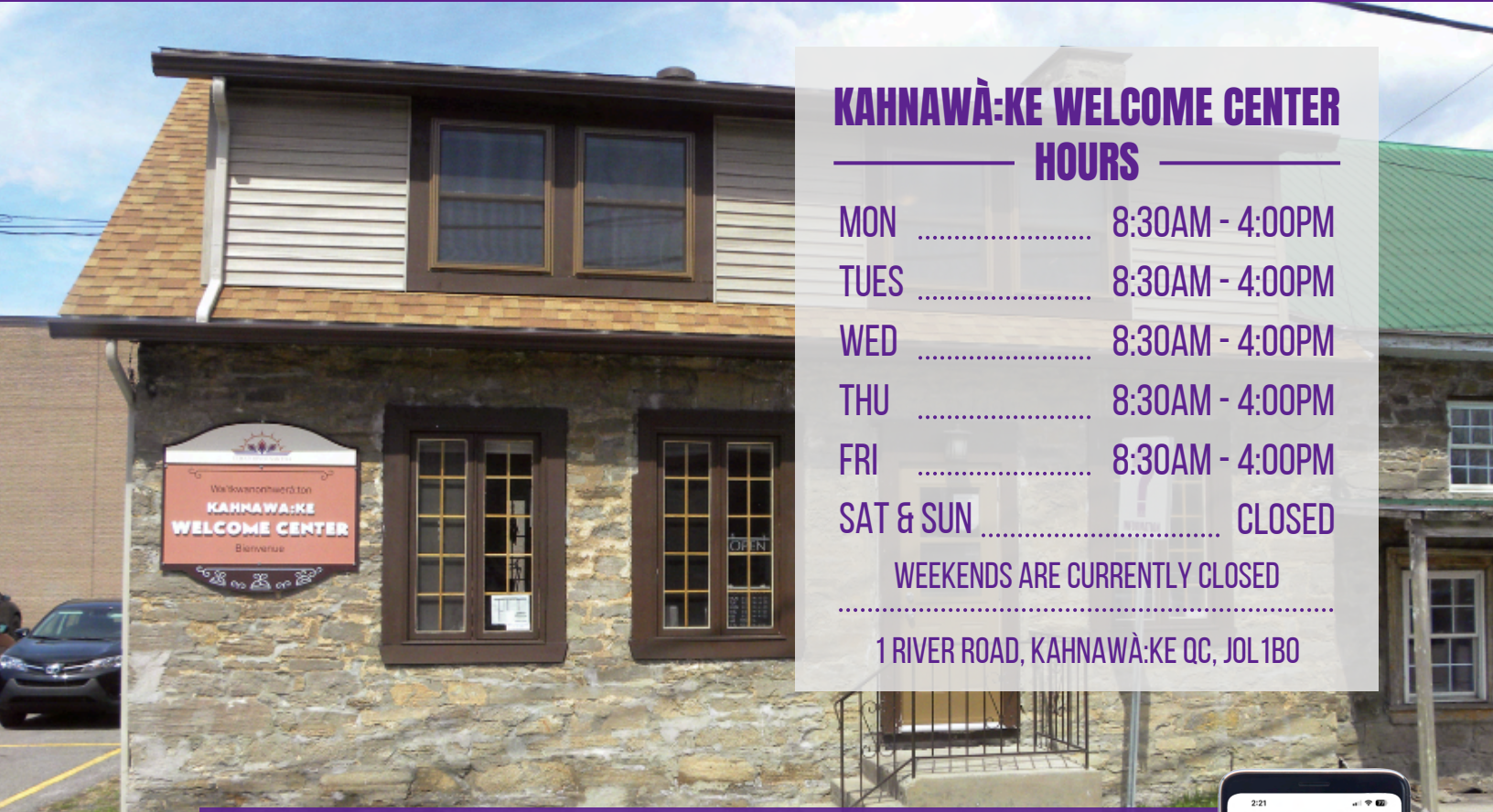
Visitors from Ottawa

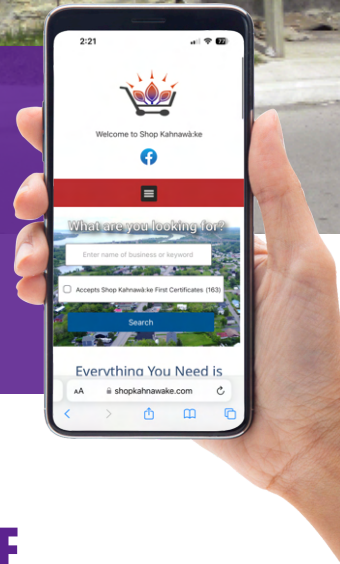

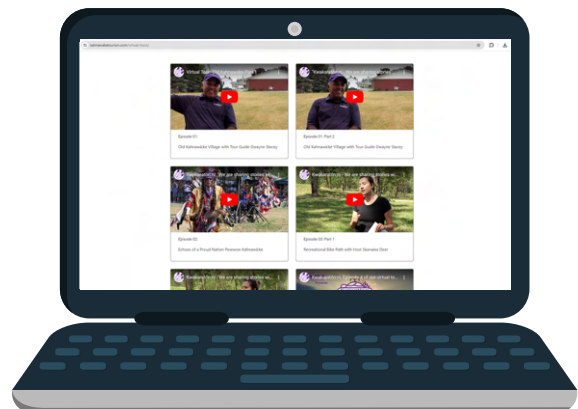
